WHO'S WHO

Emérito Amaro-Carambot joined the chorus in the summer of 2006 for GMCW's 25th anniversary concert at the Kennedy Center with Barbara Cook. He has been part of several GMCW productions, both as a performer and makeup artist, including: *The Wizard of Oz, Grease, The Pink Nutcracker, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, The Rocky Horror Show,* and *Xanadu*, among others. As a migrant from Puerto Rico, he is excited and honored to join this production and help tell the stories of those who make this country truly great, yet remain unrecognized.

Jarrod Bennett, a caffeine dependent life form, was born in an analog world but is now digital. He strives to live in tenor-land, is absolutely awkward, proud of his nerdiness, and is a strong swimmer. He's humbled to be performing with this wonderful family of musicians.

Cory Claussen has been a member of GMCW since 2008. He has been in a number of GMCW productions, including: Xanadu (Kira), The Rocky Horror Show (Brad), Grease (Danny), Alexander's House (Sam), and The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas. He has also been a part of GMCW's annual cabaret. Some of his favorite past roles include Joe in Angels in America: Millennium Approaches, Seymour in Little Shop of Horrors, Joe in Damn Yankees, as well as And the World Goes 'Round and Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris. He hails from rural lowa and spends his days thinking about financial regulatory policy for FINRA.

Michael Dumlao is honored to return to the GMCW stage with the amazing cast of *Working*. He's enjoyed playing several sassy roles for the Chorus: from Smitty in *How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying* to Molina in an exerpt from *Kiss of the Spider Woman* in GMCW's *And the Tony Goes To...* In *Working*, Michael taps into his day job as brand director and his past as an immigrant caregiver.

Romm Gatongay is both proud and humbled to join the cast of *Working*. Romm lives in southern Maryland with his husband and works as a military consultant. Romm's interest in theater began in college when he took an introduction to theater class as an elective. His path to becoming a full-fledged stage performer was put on hold when he was commissioned as an officer in the Marine Corps and remained on active duty for a number of years until his military retirement. Romm has been performing with GMCW since 2015 and appeared in GMCW's production of *How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying*.

Michael McGovern is in his third season with GMCW and is excited to be performing in *Working*. He played Krumholtz in GMCW's production of *How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying*, performed in GMCW's *Let's Misbehave* cabaret, and is a member of 17th Street Dance. Michael is a resident of NoMa in Washington, DC.

Brian Jon Moran is currently in his second season with GMCW and is also a member of 17th Street Dance. A Baltimore native, Brian studied dance and musical theater at Point Park University in Pittsburgh, PA. He spent his 20s treading the boards at theaters across the country. Select regional credits include *Hello*, *Dolly!*, *42nd Street*, *Cats*, *Gypsy*, and numerous other "classic happy dance musicals." Brian has spent his 30s working on the administrative side of theater and currently works in the development department at Shakespeare Theatre Company.

Dana Nearing, born and raised in Detroit, is heavily influenced by his Motown roots and draws inspiration and energy from his family and community. In 2013, Dana found the Gay Men's Chorus of Washington,DC and has performed with the group as a bass, baritone, tenor and featured soloist ever since, singing to inspire equality and inclusion. Dana credits GMCW for playing a major role in helping him find himself as a gay man and as a solo artist.

John O'Brien has been a member of GMCW for 15 years. Over those years he has served as a section leader, vice president of Membership, and president. He has performed in GMCW's stage productions of *The Wizard of Oz, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, Von Trapped, Xanadu*, and *How to Succeed...* John is grateful to be part of the *Working* cast.

Joshua Peterson has been in DC for five years and a member of GMCW for two years. Before singing with the Chorus, Josh sang with the Promissory Notes, GW Law School's premiere and only *a cappella* group. (They were approximately as cool as you would expect a law school *a cappella* group to be.) Josh is thankful to the amazing cast of *Working* for making his return to musical theater an incredible experience.

Mario Sengco is in his sixth year with GMCW. His musical journey began with piano at the age of six then moved to choral music in college and graduate school, which included several stints as tenor soloist and music director for church and community ensembles. Always curious and willing to push the artistic envelope, Mario enjoys performing a wide range of musical styles from early music to *a cappella*. He also currently sings with the Alexandria Harmonizers Barbershop Chorus and the Choral Arts Society. Mario is a biological oceanographer who now works on science policy at the US Environmental Protection Agency.

Erich Sommerfeldt is tickled pink to be part of *Working*. Erich is a former performer turned academic, and has been described by a satisfied student as "extremely pretentious and very annoying to listen to." This is Erich's fifth year with GMCW. He is a gin enthusiast with an Ina Garten addiction.

Other roles include Senex in *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum*, Herr Schulz in *Cabaret*, Merlin in *Camelot*, and his favorite, Charlie Brown in *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*. His directing credits include *Oklahoma!*, *Damn Yankees*, and *Guys and Dolls*. Michael originally hails from Massena, New York, a town close to the Canadian border. Michael's day job is one as a licensed clinical social worker and a therapist.

Alex Tyson has had a lifelong passion for performing. A choir director asked him to sing in a May Day mass as a child, and he was hooked.
